WANTED: WORDPRO 3+ modifications to work with Graphtrax Plus in Epson printers. Make WORDPRO send Epson ESC sequences for underline, bold (double strike), and superscripts/subscripts.-Arthur Cochrane

REPLY: AC can access the special features of his Epson with Grafrax Plus by using WordPro's Special Characters. First assign the proper ASCII values by a format line like: [check-mark]0=27:1=52:2=53:3=69:4=70:5=71:6=72 [left-arrow]. 27 is Escape, 52/53 is Italics on/off, 69/70 is Emphasized on/off and 71/72 is Double Strike on/off. Then when the special features are required, use (in Edit Mode) the command - [control] ; (semi-colon) [number 0-9] - and the screen will display an Up-Arrow and the number, e.g. "Your [up-arrow]0[up-arrow]3NAME" would print "Your NAME" with 'NAME' being emphasized. However, be aware that Word Pro thinks that a character was printed for each special command sent to the printer. This may cause line length or printer page to be off and will definitely foul up centering, justification, etc. This alignment problem can be corrected by running a trial print out then carefully re-arranging the left or right margin of the text on a line by line basis for each case where the special characters are used.-CLS
